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It All Started with A Dream...



Community First

Four local students performed landscaping and other work at the Hillsboro Elks Lodge 361 from May 28 to June 28 as part of the Summer Youth Work Experience coordinated through the Highland County Board of Developmental Disabilities and Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities. The program offers youth between the ages of 14 and 20 a chance to earn minimum wage and learn job skills while performing jobs in the area. This year 18 students participated in programs at the Highland County YMCA, Star Cinemas, Ponderosa Steakhouse, Highland County Community Action, and the Elks Golf Course. Each week, youth not only earned money but learned responsibilities to guide them as working adults. They learned skills that they can use as job experience when applying for positions later.



Our local chapter of People First meets monthly on the first Wednesday of each month at 1pm at Southern State Community College. We have eighteen members in our local chapter. Some members attend the SOAG (Southern Ohio Advocacy Group) each month as well.

Four of our local members attended the two-day conference in March. Our group was inspired by guest speakers who were interesting, informative, fun, and inspiring.
